ENTRY: Mail-in & Hand Delivered Entries close Friday, August 4. You may submit your entries online. **Online Entries close Sunday, August 6.** Payment must be made with entry. Only Visa and MasterCard accepted online. www.idahofair.com. A \$2 per exhibitor convenience fee applies. **No papers or entries accepted** if Registration papers are not in the Premium Office by Noon August 9. No exceptions, you will forfeit your entry fee. Be prepared and get your paperwork in with your entries. Entries are open June 1 – August 6th. You can jeopardize your stall placement and show entry for you and your horse.

If entering **online** copies of registration papers must be emailed to premiumoffice@idahofair.com or faxed to 208-287-5665

- The Management reserves the right to close entries whenever available space is filled. **Mail entries and copy of registration papers**, with remittance for entry fees and exhibitor passes, to: Western Idaho Fair, Premium Office, 5610 Glenwood, Boise, ID 83714. **No ringside entries will be accepted.** Exhibitor may make as many entries in each class as desired, but **no exhibitor will be allowed more than two premiums in any one class.**
- ENTRY FEES:** \$25 per horse (\$50 per horse if late). This entitles the horse to enter all classes it is eligible for. Please see entry information listed below. **No refunds on entry fees.**
- PASSES:** Exhibitors entering one or more horses may purchase two Exhibitor Passes per day for up to four days. A helper's pass may be purchased, up to four days, for every two horses entered. Cost of passes is \$5.00 each.
- PARKING:** Livestock exhibitors will be issued two vehicle parking permits. For more information see General Rules and information on page 4 or Website under General Rules.
- CAMPING:** See General Rules and information on page 4 or Website under General Rules.
- STALLS AND TACK SPACE:** No fee will be charged for stall(s), but remember to request your stall on the entry form, or on the 'comment box' at the check-out screen when entering online. A limited number of stalls are available, **ONLY** on a first-come, first-serve basis. Stalls in Race Barn area are available for use by those not stalling in Barns A and

B or Draft Horse Barn, but you will need to provide bedding for them.

The stalls in the Draft Horse barn could be dirty at arrival, the Fair Livestock employees may not have enough time to clean those stall between the Light Horse and Mule Driving Show and Registered Light Horse Show. We apologize for the inconvenience if that occurs.

Horses that are assigned stalls in Barns A and B or Draft Horse Barn must remain on the grounds Thursday through Sunday, for viewing by Fair spectators. The few Tack stalls available are for shared public use and are not a given or a privilege.

No trailers can be parked inside the Fairgrounds.

No straw can be used. Exhibitors may bring additional bedding (no straw). Only one bag of bedding will be provided with stall. You need to bring your own feed and water containers for your horses. Additional bedding for any of the barn areas can be purchased at the Premium Office and will be delivered to your stall. Please note which barn and stall number.

- ARRIVAL:** Horses to be stalled in Barns A and B may start arriving after 12 noon on Wednesday, Aug. 23, **but must be led to the stalls from the parking area.**

Show secretary will be available Thursday morning for picking up your number. Keep in mind, no barn manager on site until Thursday to keep an eye on your horse(s). All horses to be stalled in Barns A and B must be in the barns before 10:00 a.m. Friday, Aug. 25. **If not, stalls will become**

available to other participants. There will be no more exceptions for 4-H horses or other early arrivals. You may utilize the Race Horse Barns at your own risk.

Horses stalled in Draft Horse Barn may arrive at 8:00 a.m., Thursday, Aug. 24 unless other arrangements were made with Superintendent. Horses stalling in Race Barns may arrive as necessary for their shows.

D&B/Shop Arena will be used for a Drill Team competition on Thursday, Aug. 24 (until at least 11 p.m.) and will be closed for warm up to any other participants except Drill Team members. Friday morning the arena may be available as usual. If you plan on arriving early, please take that in account. The Track Side Arena is not for the Light Horse Department use at any time.

9. **RELEASE:** All exhibitors must obtain a “**Release**” permit from the Department Superintendent for transportation of livestock from the grounds. Horses brought in for the day will be able to leave after each show day is completed, but they will still need a “Release” permit. Horses being stalled in Barns A & B will be permitted to leave as they complete their classes on Sunday afternoon, Aug. 27. No traffic will be allowed inside Fairgrounds until 8:00 p.m. on Sunday evening, Aug. 27.
10. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and security of their horses, tack and equipment.
11. Exhibitors are requested to read the **Rules and Regulations** in the front of the Premium Book and/or website. Violations of any of the rules set forth in this Premium Book will forfeit all privileges and premiums.
12. **REGISTRATION PAPERS:** Photocopies of Registration Papers for each animal entered, showing the current owner and the animal’s sire and dam, **must accompany the entry form. Entries received without photocopies of registration papers will be returned. Exception:** for horses under one year of age, a confirmation paper showing that registration is being applied for or a signed statement explaining that the animal is eligible for registration and that the registration is being applied for is acceptable as long as the name and number of the animal’s sire and dam are included. For horses just sold, a copy of the registration paper and transfer certificate needs to be shown to the show secretary to establish ownership.
13. **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:** Horses must be sound, in good health, and free of communicable diseases. Out-of-state horses must meet Idaho Department of Agriculture import requirements and be accompanied by a Certificate of

Veterinary inspection dated no earlier than 30 days prior to arrival at the Western Idaho Fair.

For out-of-state Stallions, 12 months and older: the issuing veterinarian must write one of the four statements relative to Equine Viral Arteritis (EVA) “status” on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. These EVA status statements are found and defined in the Idaho State Department of Agriculture’s Animal Import Rules IDAPA 02.04.21 and on the Idaho State Department of Agriculture’s website – <http://www.agri.idaho.gov/Categories/Animals/importExport/indeximportexport.php>. Out-of-state horses **will be** required to have a valid (within the previous 12 months) Coggins (AGID or ELISA) test. All horses and mules should be vaccinated for infectious respiratory diseases transmitted animal-to-animal such as Equine Influenza and Equine Herpes Virus at least 30 days prior to exhibition. A West Nile Virus Vaccination is not required, but recommended. WNV is transmitted only from bird to mosquito to horse (NOT horse to horse and NOT from horse to mosquito to horse). All horses are subject to inspection at the Fairgrounds. Please contact your veterinarian to discuss appropriate vaccinations well in advance of the Fair.

14. **ONLY ONE BREED ASSOCIATION:** No horse may be entered in more than one breed class. If a horse is registered in more than one breed organization, the exhibitor needs to select one. No horse can be exhibited by more than one Exhibitor in the same class.
15. **MUST show in Champion and Best of Show Classes:** Horses winning first or second place in their regular halter class **must** show in **Championship Class** or forfeit all prizes previously won. Horses being named **Champion must** show in the **Best of Show Class** or forfeit all prizes previously won. Exhibitor does not pre-enter these classes.
16. If a pony breed is to show, it has to be at least 12.1 hands tall to compete for safety reasons.

CLASS RULES:

- All classes will be governed by Western Idaho Fair Rules, unless otherwise stated.
- In halter classes for Section 4, Colored Breeds and Section 5, Other Registered Horse Breeds, each animal will be judged against the **Ideal Standard For Its Particular Breed**. The animal coming closest to meeting its breed standard will be placed first in the class, the horse coming next closest will be placed second, and so on.
- Horses shall be considered to be one year old on the first day of January following actual date of foaling.
- Junior Exhibitor denotes any exhibitor 18 years of age or under as of January 1 of current year. Persons born on January 1 shall assume the greater age on that date.
- Stallions are prohibited to be shown in Youth Rider classes or by Junior Exhibitors, with the exception of Miniatures and current year colts. No stallions allowed in the Walk Trot Classes.**
- A. In all **English Classes**, riders should wear either Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat attire. Coats may be removed at Judge’s option.
B. **APPOINTMENT:**
Bridle: Either Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat bridles and bits may be used. No martingales or tie downs.
Saddle: must be English type.
C. **Horse will be judged** on how pleasurable they look to ride. They should move with long, low strides, reaching forward with ease and smoothness, be able to lengthen stride and cover ground with a relaxed, free flowing movement. Horses should be responsive and smooth in transition. When

asked to extend the trot or hand gallop, they should move out with the same flowing motion.

Horses to be shown at a flat-footed walk, trot and canter, both ways of the ring. May be asked to extend the trot.

Horses are to be reversed to the inside, away from the rail.

Horses may be asked to change to canter from a flat-footed walk or trot at the Judge's discretion.

D. In Class 135, the first, second and third place horses from each of the English Pleasure classes compete together in this class.

7. **A. In all Western Classes**, the rider shall wear western attire consisting of western hat and long sleeved western shirt. Jacket or vest may be worn and western pants or chaps. Western boots are required. Games may be ridden without a hat and long sleeves – think neat.

B. APPOINTMENT: Western saddle and bridle. Senior horses shall be shown in bit. Junior horses (5 years and younger) can be shown in hackamore, snaffle bit or bit. (Two hands can be used on snaffle or hack.) Chain chin straps will be permitted, but must meet the approval of the Judge, must be at least ½" in width and lie flat against the jaw. No martingales or tie-downs.

C. A good pleasure horse has a free-flowing, forward moving stride of reasonable length in keeping with his conformation. Ideally, he should have a balanced, flowing motion. He should carry his head and neck in a relaxed, natural position, with his poll level at or slightly above the level of his withers.

Horses will be shown at a walk, jog and lope on a reasonably loose rein or light contact without undue restraint. May be asked to extend the trot and/or walk.

Horses must work both ways of the ring at all three gaits to demonstrate their ability with different leads. The judge may ask to extend the walk, jog or lope, one or both ways of the ring. Horses will be asked to back easily and stand quietly.

If using split reins, one finger can be between reins. With Romal, hands shall be around the reins.

D. In Class 159, the first, second and third place horses from each of the Western Pleasure classes compete together in this class.

8. In all Gaited classes, equipment use must be humane and performance appropriate. Barefoot or stamped stack shoes.
9. English and Western Classes, except gaited and Arabian Classes, will use AQHA Handbook as a guideline. Trail could have additional non-regulated, safe obstacles to add to the course.
10. In lead-line, no stallions are allowed and the handler must be 18 years of age. For acceptable clothing see APPOINTMENT rules. Saddles should fit the rider or have stirrups attached suitable for lead-liner to have feet safely in stirrups. Exhibitor should be four (4) years and older.
11. ENTRY is deemed ACCEPTANCE of the RULES.
12. **All decisions of the Judge are final.**

Best of Show Overall (Class 112) The Show Champions from each gender will compete together for Overall Best of Halter.

Champion English Pleasure & Champion Western Pleasure.

High Point Gaming Horse (Game classes only: 178 – 180) Points are awarded as follows: 1st – 10 points, 2nd – 9 points, 3rd – 8 points and so on. In the event of a tie, a coin toss will determine the winner. Horses must compete in a minimum of 2 classes.

Barn Prize: The Western Idaho Fair will give a \$25 cash award for the best kept stall and best cleaned aisle. Judging for this award will be done in both a.m. and p.m.

Each rider has the same amount of time to negotiate as many obstacles as possible. Each obstacle is assigned a point value based on its degree of difficulty, and each rider tries to amass as high a score as possible within allotted time limit! Ride the entire course one time covering all the obstacles, then pick your Gamblers choices. **Dead obstacle:** if the horse knocks down any portion of the obstacle, it will be considered dead. Thus, a rider may NOT repeat this

obstacle. Also, if a horse hits a pole or portion of the obstacle and it is severely disrupted, the obstacle is considered dead. **Credit** will be given as long as the horse goes over the poles. Breaking gait or switching leads is acceptable. Some obstacles may have bonus points available. Those will be clearly stated on the pattern. **Fault:** if a horse steps out of an obstacle (i.e. back-thru or box), a zero score for this attempt will be allowed. Horse may be ridden in approved bit regardless of age, but must be ridden one handed in bit or 2 handed in a bosal or snaffle. Protective leg wraps/boots are acceptable. **Time:** there will be a designated start/finish line. The rider will be given a 30-second warning prior to the end of the time limit. If the rider is involved in an obstacle as time is called, he/she may elect to finish that obstacle and, if successful, will receive credit. If the rider is just approaching an obstacle when time is called, no credit will be given regardless of completion of that obstacle. If the rider has time remaining after attempting all the obstacles, he/she may increase their score by repeating any obstacle again as long as it is not disrupted, knocked over or severely disturbed. The rider may NOT do the same obstacle back to back unless it is the only obstacle left that is not considered dead. **Tie:** ties for any places will be determined by coin toss.

- 124. Wild Horse & Burro In-Hand Trail Challenge: **6:00 p.m. or later.** Course obstacles will be adjusted. (Horses adopted less than 2 years and/or 3 years old & under, not shown under saddle yet. Need to be BLM branded, no home-bred mustangs.) 4-H Project horses, current year, will be judged as a separate entity in addition to the other horses. Trophy provided by the BLM. Mustangs can also be shown in Halter in Section 5, Other Registered Horses in their category and age group, Showmanship and In-Hand Trail. \$10 Additional Entry Fee (Up to \$200 Jackpot added. Note: winner does not take all – amount added to regular premiums).
Limited to 20 participants! Please add \$10 to your entry fees.

Music needs to be cued and ready to go. Acceptable: CD with one song on it or your phone with a song cued, etc.

The horse needs to perform the following: 2 sliding stops, 2 rollbacks and side passes to each direction and use of the trot over poles (they will be placed on the East side just South of the entry gate, no changing of poles), at least one lead change. Three minutes maximum (length of a normal song) to perform a freestyle pattern in approved tack, either Western, English or Bareback. Music optional but should compliment the pattern. Props are welcome, so are costumes. Designed to show a horse's ability and willingness to perform several tasks that are asked of him in a quiet manner with forward cadence in the gait.

A horse will be given credit if his head is in a normal position, his ears are alert, and moving at a natural free flowing speed for the gait chosen, for demonstrating athleticism, smoothness, and finesse while performing all gaits. Credit also will be given for making a smooth transition between the gaits, for keeping the correct lead, and for maintaining the gait.

A horse will be heavily penalized for: artificial appearance of frame or gait, extremely low head carriage, excessively slow and/or a four beat way of travel in the lope, and any display of resistance. While moving down the rail, the horse's body should be straight. May be ridden with 2 hands regardless of bit; senior horses may be ridden in snaffle.

Entries must be postmarked by this date. **Any late entries are subject to double entry fees and prior approval of the Superintendent.** You may submit your entries online. **Online deadline is Aug. 8.** Payment must be made with entry. Only Visa and MasterCard accepted online. www.idahofair.com. A \$2 per exhibitor convenience fee applies.

Explanation:

FOUR minutes and four riders are to perform a typically fun, themed routine with costumes for both horse and rider. Music is key and sets the tone for these very entertaining routines.

Note: horsemanship and equitation are NOT scored so ANYone can try. Please take a parade lap just before beginning your routine so the crowd and judges can enjoy the great costumes.

Class 2: Free/Rodeo

Entry Fee: \$75 – Starts around 6:30 p.m.

The Western Idaho Fair will provide a trophy for 1st and Rosettes for 2nd – 4th place and:

Premiums: 1st - \$175 2nd - \$125 3rd - \$100 4th - \$75

Explanation: Any number of riders are allowed, time limit is EIGHT minutes. The emphasis on this routine is on crowd appeal, showmanship and excitement. Halts, salutes, props, announcers and crowd interaction are encouraged.

Perform to the music of choice and coordinated attire and take advantage of this unique venue to show some real pizzazz: **be bold!**

Class 3: Short Program

Entry Fee: \$50 - Starts around 8:00 p.m.

The Western Idaho Fair will provide a trophy for 1st and Rosettes for 2nd – 4th place and:

Premiums: 1st - \$125 2nd - \$100 3rd - \$75 4th - \$50

Explanation: Any number of riders are allowed with a time limit of SIX minutes. This theme-less routine showcases the 12 maneuvers in an interesting and precise manner to show the judge the technical abilities of the team. Each of the 12 maneuvers is scored separately.

Required Maneuvers each year:

1. Change of Pace
2. Single File Cross
3. Circle
4. Maneuver by Pairs
5. Maneuver by Fours
6. Company Front

Drawn examples of the maneuvers are available: contact chairperson.

Additional Maneuvers this year:

1. Herringbone
2. Box
3. Suicide Wheel
4. Basket Weave
5. Pinwheel
6. Null & Void

Scoring

Emphasis will be placed on performance of the drill, **NOT** on uniforms, tack, or matching of horses. Please note: horses' muzzles and whiskers do NOT need to be trimmed. Bridle paths and fetlocks at the most, neat and tidy is all that is required.

Execution of Drill: Most important is alignment, spacing, timing & coordination. Were the lines straight, were the circles evenly round? Was the spacing consistent side-by-side or in a line; or were there gaps? Was the timing coordinated, or was it haphazard? Does the execution of the drill look solid, planned and smooth?

Originality, Variety, and Attractiveness of Patterns: Were original and varied patterns used? Were they presented well? Are there different groups of riders, leaders, approaches and exits of maneuvers?

Spectacularity and Crowd Appeal: Was the drill designed to please an audience in its tempo, maneuver placement, flag usage and overall energy? This is scored much higher in the Free/Rodeo routine.

Degree of Difficulty: more difficult routines with complex maneuvers receives more credit than a simpler routine with easier maneuvers, set-ups, etc.

Performance and Manners of Horses: Were they well-mannered, did they maintain the proper gait?

Theme, Costume & Flags: special category for Free/Rodeo to add points for any props, special costuming or theme. Also applies to the Quad performance at slightly higher value.

Miscellaneous:

- Specific score sheets the judges will use for each routine are available for review, these may be slightly different than other local competitions. Contact chairperson to receive a copy.
- Each team will be allowed to take a lap inside the arena before each routine while the judges are finishing the scoring of the previous team.
- Routines will be started inside the gate. Whistle blow will start time and double whistle to stop time.
- Arena warm-up times determined after the August 8th registration date. These half-hour reserved times for each team will begin at noon to about 3:30. Any team with arrival difficulties will be given a later time. The arena is also open for your general use from early morning until noon.
- Award ceremony estimated to be around 9:30 p.m.
- Judges will be available for review and questions immediately following awards.
